Mr Parbhoo has a BCom from Wits and an Honours from UNISA. In December 2003 Ketan started at Microsoft as a Solution Sales Specialist for infrastructure. He moved into the Solution Sales Specialist for Information Worker products role after 6 months, where his team had great success with Sharepoint sales and was part of the IW sales team that won the best IW Sales team in the world award in 2005.

Ketan was then asked to head up the newly formed Provincial and Local government (PLG) sales team in Public Sector, with responsibility for both EPG and SMS&P Sales teams. During the first year in the new role, his team more than doubled the size of the business, resulting in the entire team going on the predecessor to the Circle of Excellence award in Monaco. The following year they continued to grow the business substantially and this time the team won the best PLG team worldwide award.

Ketan then took on the role of Public Sector Sales manager responsible for both Central and PLG for one year and was then offered the role of Mteto's business manager, when he joined Microsoft from IBM. As part of the special project, Ketan was asked to help develop a plan for addressing the ownership pillar of the BBBEE. Working with the SLT, his team then came up with a plan which resulted in the approval from Microsoft Corporation for the R500 million investment into the Equity Equivalent Programme. When the new role, of the Equity Equivalent Lead became available, Ketan applied to take on this special investment and was fortunate enough to be selected for it. He has been in this role since October 2009 which involved negotiating with government for the approval of the programme and then selecting the current 5 ISVs to be part of the programme, through an extensive public process. Ketan and his team spent at least six months planning and restructuring all of the ISVs to align their products to Microsoft's strategy and positioning them for growth. The team is working with the ISVs to develop next versions of their products and driving sales of their existing ones into their customers, helping to pull Microsoft revenue as a result. Ketan was very honored to be recognized for the work done on this programme and received the Circle of Excellence Gold Ward in 2011 and joint recipient of the Managing Directors Award 2011

In March 2012, Ketan was asked to take on the Dynamics Director position reporting into Managing Director. This position involved leading a team of professionals to drive their value proposition of ERP and CRM into the South African market.

Prof Etienne Barnard obtained his Ph. D. in Electrical and Computer Engineering from Carnegie Mellon University in 1989, writing his thesis on “Neural Networks for Scene Analysis”. He has since then been active in research and development in pattern recognition and speech processing. He has held a number of academic positions, and has also worked in industry. Barnard has co-authored more than 200 refereed scientific publications, on topics including pattern recognition, neural networks, speech recognition and human-computer interaction. He holds a number of international patents in speech processing and is a past Associate Editor of the IEEE Transactions on Neural Networks. Barnard’s research contributions have been recognized in various ways, including Google Research Award in 2009 and 2011; he is currently Research Professor at the North-West University, Vaal Triangle Campus.

Dr. Jakob van Zyl is the associate director of Project Formulation and Strategy at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Formerly, he was the director for JPL's Astronomy and Physics Directorate. Van Zyl received an honors bachelor's degree cum laude in electronics engineering from the University of Stellenbosch, Stellenbosch, South Africa. He received both his master's and his doctorate in electrical engineering from Caltech. Van Zyl joined JPL in 1986 and held positions of increasing responsibility in the synthetic aperture radar program. In addition, he managed the Radar Science and Engineering Section, the Earth Science Flight Missions and Experiments Office, and the Focused Physical Oceanography and Solid Earth Program Office. He was appointed deputy director for the Astronomy and Physics Directorate in 2002. He has been an adjunct faculty member in the Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering Department, University of Southern California, where he taught the class "Remote Sensing Systems from Space" from 1997 to 2001. Since 2002, he has been teaching the class "Physics and Techniques of Remote Sensing" at Caltech.

Shirley Alexander is Professor of Learning Technologies at the University of Technology, Sydney (UTS) where she is currently Deputy Vice-Chancellor & Vice President (Teaching, Learning & Equity). Her long term research agenda has been on the effective use of information and communication technologies in learning in both higher education and the school sectors.

UTS is in the process of spending \$1 billion in a major campus redevelopment and Shirley is chairing the Learning Future project to ensure that the campus contains purpose-built learning spaces and technologies to meet tomorrow's learning needs. She is also chair of the Digital Education Advisory Committee reporting to the Federal Minister for Education. This committee has been asked to research, consult and write a strategy for Australian governments to deliver and leverage a highly innovative digital learning environment for Australia's students.
